Office of the City Manager

Citizens, business owners & other interested parties:

Wrapping up the first month of the new fiscal year, the City of Clewiston has a significant number of public facility capital improvement projects either underway or slated to begin in the near term. The long awaited and grant funded \$5.6 million C-21 elevated bridge project providing much improved and safer access to the Herbert Hoover Dike and Lake Okeechobee recreation area has progressed to the point it has already been opened up for public use. A most obvious improvement is the panoramic lake view it offers as visitors reach the crest of the bridge. Even more importantly, the safety enhancements this new facility provides are numerous and obvious as all forms of users including vehicles both large and small, bicycles, golf carts and most importantly pedestrians are significantly benefitted. The situation will continue to improve as remaining details of the project are completed in the coming weeks including upgrades to street lighting, necessary revisions to parking areas resulting from the new access alignment, removal of the old S-169 structures along the canal, remaining miscellaneous aesthetic and safety enhancements, as well as, additional

adjustments to bike lanes and pedestrian walkway connections or extensions. The other good news is the completed improvements will not only improve boat launch area parking ingress and egress conditions, but it will also result in a net gain of both boat trailer and vehicle available parking at the facility. Hopefully, early in the new calendar year, the city will be able to plan a celebration of this major infrastructure achievement during which proper recognition of the supporters who helped make it happen can occur. In the meantime, now that the tourism season has begun, the city will continue efforts to work with the marina and other stakeholders and beneficiaries to coordinate and support planned fishing tournaments and related events in Clewiston which will give us the opportunity to showcase progress to date.

Utilizing other major grant funds the city has been successful in receiving this past year, engineers and staff are actively pursuing design, approvals and permits to complete the planned and now funded extension of upgraded water utility lines along the highway 27 corridor to the Airglades Airport site. This project combined with the Hendry County administered grant funded utility project already underway to construct a wastewater force main connected to the city wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) and extended along the same corridor route will incent private investment and facilitate economic development in the affected area. Simultaneously with these important utility improvements, the city is now funded sufficiently with additional federal and state grant dollars to proceed with the essential long awaited comprehensive upgrade and expansion of the circa 1980's WWTP facility. The city is already in the process of moving forward with design, permitting and contracting of this most important facility improvement which is key to the Clewiston community's long term future.

These utility projects are currently funded with a combined total of \$24 million in the form of federal and state grants already approved. The city and county are also actively pursuing additional federal and state grant funding of approximately \$16 million to further expand the WWTP as future planned growth from private investment demands over the next several years and to also extend a wastewater force main southeast of the Clewiston city limits to the Hookers Point community and to upgrade aged water utility lines in portions of the Harlem community which the city already serves.

As for other smaller scale projects: the city is nearing completion of the first of several planned grant and donation funded neighborhood playground equipment upgrades; the design is underway for the next phase of the grant funded Royal Palm tree landscape enhancement project along the highway 27 corridor throughout the city limits; and, in cooperation with the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), the city is pursuing several projects including installation of sidewalk and other safety improvements along and adjacent to portions of the highway 27 corridor within the city and specifically in the vicinity around the Civic Park complex. Other FDOT grant funded major improvements to the streetscape along the high profile "downtown" section of Ventura Avenue from Deane Duff to W. C. Owen are in the planning and design phase with the expectation to be under construction in 2024. Likewise, the city has received a future grant commitment for streetscape improvements along North Francisco Street which will provide enhanced access to the new bridge and lakefront area. The city expects to be able to pursue design and permitting of that project later next year when the approved funding is released. To address the unfunded street

segment between the new C-21 bridge and the future improved section of North Francisco, the city has filed another grant application with FDOT to improve and upgrade that portion of Hoover Dike Road.

Considering these impactful infrastructure improvements, the next couple of years and beyond hold great promise for significantly improved quality of life for the Clewiston community. When combined with already approved and expected private sector development plans and investment in expanded residential, commercial and industrial/warehousing type projects in and around the city, it is truly a bright outlook from my view for this fine community and its deserving citizens and stakeholders.

Thank you for your continued support and interest in the City of Clewiston.

 - The Robotic Mini Golf STEM programs were held on September 13th and September 27th with a total of 29 participants.




- Alan Jay Dealership received their Temporary Certificate of Occupancy, which allows them to open their doors to the public very soon.

TEN COMMON CODE VIOLATIONS



COMMON CODE VIOLATIONS

1. YARD MAINTENANCE STANDARDS

Maintenance of yards and swales/rights-of-way abutting property are the responsibility of the property owner. The right-of-way must be free of obstructions caused by trees, vegetation, or other objects.

2. INOPERATIVE MOTOR VEHICLES

Inoperative and/or derelict vehicles are not permitted. A vehicle is considered inoperable if a current tag isn't displayed and/or it is not fully equipped to legally and safely operate on public streets.

3. JUNK, TRASH AND DEBRIS

Junk, auto parts, furniture, trash, tires, building materials, tree trimmings, and any other debris cannot be left in the yard and must be properly disposed of.

4. PARKING

Parking is permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles in residential properties only on a legal driveway or in a garage.

5. COMMERCIAL EQUIPMENT

Commercial equipment and vehicles cannot be parked or stored in a residential area unless they are in a fully enclosed structure.

6. MAINTENANCE OF STRUCTURES

Exterior building structures and walls shall be maintained in a secure and attractive manner.

7. CONDITION OF STRUCTURES

Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens, and other exterior parts of a structure must be maintained in weather tight, rodent proof, sound condition and in good repair.

8. OUTDOOR STORAGE

Outdoor storage is prohibited. You may not keep indoor furniture, household appliances, auto parts, building materials, or any other similar items outside.

9. ILLEGAL DWELLING UNITS

Dwelling units added to interior/exterior of a structure without proper permits are illegal regardless of how long they have

10. HOME OCCUPATIONS

Home occupations like all businesses shall be licensed and pay applicable business taxes pursuant to Chapter 66 Article lll of the City of Clewiston Florida.



Animal Services

In the month of October 2023, Animal Services reported the intake of more than 52 cats and 38 dogs.

During the past few weeks, Chief Lewis, Commander Brophy, and Commander Levins have been

making more improvements to the shelter. Being over-capacity means some pups stay in temporary kennels until they get adopted or rescued. Although we put them in the shade, the concrete can still get hot. So, we treated the entire area with a product that reduces the temperature 20 degrees! In addition, the guillotine door replacement project has been started with about half already replaced. That project is anticipated to be completed in the next two weeks.
